We offer our time, gifts and resources in sharing God's love, seeking to nurture the faith of our congregation and to invite others on the journey of faith. We seek to grow and grow younger.

Serve Others

We offer a safe, accessible, accepting, kind and inclusive place for all. We demonstrate our love for our neighbour in word and deed. We aim to reach out more widely into our city and diocese.

Transform Communities

We acknowledge our own need for transformation, learning from our past and actively effecting positive change. We seek to be good partners to others in transforming relationships and lives in our city, diocese and world. We aim to increase our impact in effecting change.

Worship God

Bristol Cathedral is a 900-year-old place of worship. Our work and worship is rooted in faith and responsive to the Spirit. We treasure our inheritance and seek to enhance and promote the use of our building, our musical tradition and our liturgical riches. We aim to share our resources more widely.

Support our Bishops and Diocese

Bristol Cathedral is the seat of the Bishop and the mother church of the diocese. We week to share our life with the Bishop and parishes by providing opportunities for teaching, celebration and encounter. We aim to increase a sense of mutual belonging.

As part of this process the Dean and Chapter has identified four values that will define how Bristol Cathedral works.

These are that we will be open, generous, creative, and brave.

THE DEAN'S REVIEW OF 2023

Following Jesus

Throughout the year there were opportunities for the congregation to grow in faith and understanding of their faith. The theme for the first part of the year was the diversity of all God's children with an emphasis on hearing from different communities and different voices. Our Lent Course, entitled Seeing the Bible through other eyes examined the story of the Samaritan woman through the lens of communities as varied as American gangs and prisoners to church members in Southeast Asia, as well as historical and critical views of the text. Fr Azariah France Williams, author of Ghost Ship, led our Lent Quiet Day with a mixture of reflective and creative activities.

A conference, The Beloved Community; A place for everyone at the table, was held on Saturday 18 March and attracted around 150 people to explore issues of diversity and inclusion. The keynote speakers were Steve Chalke, founder of Oasis, Mike Royal, Chair of Churches Together in Britain, and KT Tupling, disability advisor to the Diocese of Oxford. As well as a variety of panels, workshops and music, participants enjoyed a spicy lunch from the Caribbean Kitchen and a Eucharist with preacher Sally Hitchiner, associate vicar of St Martin in the Fields.

In the Autumn we launched a Theology Book Club which has attracted twenty members who have been meeting monthly to discuss a book over a glass of wine.

Our Advent Quiet Day in December was led by the former Bishop of Liverpool, Paul Bayes, on the theme of hospitality. This was complemented by a study day led by the Cathedral Clergy on the theme of hospitality in the Old Testament.

Throughout the year, Canon Jonnie has continued to lead collective worship at both Bristol Cathedral Choir School and Cathedral Primary School, enabling children and young people to encounter the Christian story in engaging ways. At Christmas and Easter there are special interactive events Christmas and Easter "in a Box". He has formed a small Christian Union in BCCS enabling young people to explore issues of faith. The Youth Group continues to meet on Thursday evenings, for pizza, conversation and fun.

Serving Bishop and Diocese

Former Canon Theologian Martin Gainsborough was consecrated as Bishop of Kingston in Canterbury Cathedral on 2 February 2024. Members of the Cathedral Clergy, staff and congregation travelled to support Martin on this very happy occasion.

The Diocese bade farewell to Bishop Lee Rayfield at the Maundy Thursday Eucharist. Bishop Lee had been Bishop of Swindon since 2005 and the Cathedral was packed with clergy for this celebration. The Bishop of Swindon is responsible for sponsoring the ordination of new clergy in the Diocese, so many people had reason to be grateful to Lee for his support over the years.

The new Bishop of Swindon is the former Archdeacon of Bristol, Neil Warwick. His consecration took place in Canterbury on 2 November and he was installed as a member of the College of Canons of the Cathedral at Evensong on 10 December.

The Dean played a full part as a member of the Bishop's Staff in the role out of Transforming Church Together, the Diocesan vision and strategy which was successful in gaining a grant of over $\pounds 6m$ to support parishes in their ministry, with a special emphasis on young people and deprived areas, over the next five years. This grant includes a small amount to promote racial justice in the life of the Cathedral.

Welcoming Others

The primary focus on welcome in 2023 was the preparatory work needed to ensure that the Cathedral can be more accessible to people with mobility issues in the future. As can be seen from the summary of fabric projects described elsewhere in this report, work is now underway to ensure that floors are safer and there is more level access around the Cathedral building.

The Cathedral was a major community focus during the weekend of the Coronation of King Charles III. The coronation itself was live streamed and attracted 500-600 people to experience the service from within the Cathedral. The congregation enjoyed a community lunch of Coronation Chicken and Coronation trifle together with a quiz and singalong animated by Canon Nicola, followed by Evensong with Civic guests including the Lord Lieutenant and High Sheriff.

To celebrate the 650th anniversary of the founding Charter of Bristol, in partnership with the City Council and St George's arts centre, we hosted Party on the Green on 18 June. The day began with an outdoor Eucharist and continued with stalls, children's activities and a programme of world music on College Green.

In November over 16,000 people came through the Cathedral to enjoy the Lux Muralis show, Force of Nature. This immersive sound and light show filled the Cathedral with images and sounds of earth, wind, fire and water. It attracted many people who had never been to the Cathedral before and raised significant income through ticket sales. Using the event to also publicise Christmas services and events resulted in growth in numbers of visitors over Christmas which had declined during the pandemic.

November saw the last of the graduation ceremonies for the University of the West of England to be held in Bristol Cathedral. With over 10,000 graduates each year, UWE has outgrown our facilities. While this marks the end of a historic relationship, the loss of the ceremonies also opens doors for the Cathedral to consider new ways of revenue raising and a more flexible use of the outdoor space at the West End of the Cathedral.

Worshipping God

During the year the Cathedral took over responsibility for the running of the Lord Mayor's Chapel. This historic place of worship had once been the Chapel of the St Mark's alms houses, a Berkley foundation. When the foundation was dissolved by Henry VIII, the Chapel was bought by the Mayor and Corporation of the City and remains one of only two "civic peculiars" in the country. The Cathedral has committed to maintaining worship in the Chapel, which has a small but faithful congregation and choir, and to providing a focus for some civic services, including an annual service for the Lord Mayor on St Mark's Day. Although the lease has not yet been formally signed, the intention is that the Cathedral will rent the Chapel from the Council on a peppercorn rent and will aim to develop its use as a venue for worship, music and events. The Chapel is currently open from 10am to 4pm on Thursday to Saturday.

The staff of the Music Department was expanded to welcome William Forrest as Music Assistant, in a role generously funded by the Bristol Cathedral Choral Foundation. William supports the Music department in a wide range of areas including organ accompaniment, chorister rehearsals, vocal training/sectional work, and outreach. William is also the organist and choir director for the Lord Mayor's Chapel.

Music in the Cathedral continued to revive post-pandemic and it was very good to welcome back the BBC to broadcast Evensong live from the Cathedral on 10 May reprising some of the music from the Coronation Civic Evensong and premiering the anthem Three Masts by Richard Barnard.

In September former girl choristers returned to celebrate the 20^{th} anniversary of the girls' choir by singing Evensong and enjoying a celebratory tea.

In October the Music Department put on a week long Festival of Evensong with a series of talks about the organ, the choral tradition, the psalms, and a discoursed Evensong, followed by wine to enable the congregation to meet the musicians and get to know one another a little.

Services in the run up to Christmas were well attended. In particular, the shorter carol services proved particularly popular with over 400 people attending each of the early evening offers of Shoppers Carols and a Shorter Carol Service in the week before Christmas. Canon Nicola's innovative Toddler Carols was as popular as ever, with buggies and prams queuing up for both morning and afternoon services.

On Christmas Day, after the final notes of the Widor Toccata died away at the end of the Eucharist, there was a sense of sadness in the air, and a tear or two shed. The Cathedral organ was disconnected and preparations were stepped up for its removal to Durham in the New Year for a full restoration by Harrison & Harrison.

We continued to invite significant preachers over the year including Azariah France Williams, Tosin Oladipo, Chaplain to the Archbishop of Canterbury and Dr Carlton Turner, lecturer in the theology at Queen's Foundation Birmingham.

Transforming Communities

Work continued to consult the local community, in particular Christians of African and Afro-Caribbean heritage, about the legacy of slavery in Bristol Cathedral. The Dean and Canon Missioner visited a number of Caribbean elders' groups to talk with them about their experience of racism in the city and their view of the Cathedral. We ran a series of workshops for children at KS2 and KS3 teaching about the legacy of slavery and exploring ideas of memorialisation and justice with them. This work will provide the foundation for future schools' workshops and was the source of a study of children's attitudes to racism by the University of the West of England.

All God's Children, our exhibition highlighting research around the legacy of slavery in the Cathedral, which demonstrates how at least 20% of our burials and memorials in the period from 1600 to 1900 are of people with first or second order connections to the slave economy, has attracted nationwide attention and interest. In May the Dean spoke at a conference entitled Imperial Legacies, Sacred Spaces in Chester and in June she made a presentation on the work to the Association of English Cathedrals annual conference. In September we held an exhibition of photographs of families of the original Windrush generation by the photojournalist Jim Grover. This was complemented by photographs of the first generation Caribbean migrants in Bristol by Garfield McKenzie. Both exhibitions encouraged visitors from the Afro-Caribbean community and discussion about the way in which heritage and tradition have been passed down, or not, to younger generations.

Work continues researching the best way for the Cathedral to achieve its goal of carbon zero by 2030. The need for this work was highlighted by the installation of Luke Jerram's Oil Fountain in the Cathedral in June. The fountain appeared to be filled with oil and prompted thoughts about our dependence on oil and petrochemicals all of which have a damaging effect on climate change and polluting the earth. A series of talks and events supported the exhibition, which included a striking intervention by the Red Rebels, a performance group who visited the fountain highlighting the blood we have in common with all creatures.

Our homeless outreach team are out on the streets around the Cathedral each weekday, chatting to those experiencing homelessness, offering a hot drink or dry socks, and signposting support services. Volunteers also support the Bristol Churches Night Shelter, and this year covered 32 shifts, provided 16 evenings of hot meals, and helped to get 21 people into more permanent accommodation. The challenge of homelessness was highlighted in a service to remember those who have died experiencing homelessness, which was animated by our Curate and Chaplain for Housing Nic Harris.

Clergy

We were joined briefly by a new curate, Anthea Anthony who was ordained in June 2023. The role was envisaged as one in partnership with St Agnes Church. However, due to health challenges, it was decided at the end of the year that Anthea would focus her ministry only at St Agnes. We were grateful for Anthea's energy and imagination in the short time she was with us.

We celebrated thirty years of dedicated service to the Cathedral by our Executive Assistant Sarah Morris. Sarah has worked for four Deans in that time and has been an invaluable support to every one of them. We were pleased to welcome back Robert and Janet Grimley, and David and Janet Hoyle to honour Sarah on this occasion.

Kathryn Goldsmith, our Minor Canon for Worship and Liturgy was appointed as Precentor at Wakefield Cathedral, her final Sunday was Epiphany 2024.

Canon Nicola Stanley retired shortly after Christmas; her final Sunday was 22 Jan 2024.

Governance

In September 2023, Bristol Cathedral completed its registration with the Charity Commission as part of the new governance arrangements set out in the Cathedral's Measure 2021. This was the culmination of a complete review of our governance arrangements and the drafting of a new Constitution and Statutes. This work was overseen by a committee chaired by Charles Wyld (previously Chair of the Cathedral Council and now Chair of the Cathedral External Stakeholders Group, known as the Cathedral Advisory Group), and taken forward by our temporary Governance Lead, Cecile Gillard and Chief Operating Officer, Ben Silvey.

In the course of the governance review key policies were reviewed and updated as necessary, a new governance structure was established, and committee and advisory group terms of reference were written and adopted.

The Chapter

Chapter is the body of trustees that directs and oversees administration of the affairs of the Cathedral, and consists of the Dean, who is the Chair, all the Residentiary Canons and lay members. During 2023 there were eight members of chapter, including five non-executive members. The Chief Operating Officer / Chapter Clerk also attends meetings (and serves as Secretary), along with the Finance and Operations Director and the Dean's Executive Assistant as minute taker. Under the new governance arrangements one of the non-executive members is appointed by the Bishop and is the Senior Non-Executive Member who chairs Chapter in the temporary absence of the Dean.

A lay member shall hold office for three years but shall be eligible for a further two terms of office. Lay members are appointed as lay Canons of the Cathedral.

New members of Chapter receive a comprehensive induction which includes meeting with key members of staff, briefing on the operations of the Cathedral and a tour of the building, its precincts and its properties. They are also encouraged to attend a Chapter training day course run by the Association of English Cathedrals.

Chapter met on ten occasions during the year, with papers for each meeting circulated one week in advance by email. Decisions are taken at Chapter meetings, unless specifically delegated to a specified person or group of people to take between meetings.

College of Canons

The College of Canons comprises the Dean of the Cathedral, every Bishop Suffragan, every Canon and every Archdeacon in the diocese. While not a formal part of the governance structure, the College has an important role supporting the Cathedral's mission and ministry and acting as ambassadors of the Cathedral to the diocese, ambassadors of the diocese to the Cathedral and as counsellors to the Bishop. The College met twice to discuss progress on key projects and theological issues.

Finance Committee

The Finance Committee advises the Dean and Chapter on all matters relating to the financial position and performance of the Cathedral. As a matter of course it reviews the annual budget, periodic management accounts and annual financial statements. It invites the auditor to give a briefing on the state of the Cathedral's financial position, its systems for accounting and internal control, and reviews the annual management letter relating to Chapter's responsibilities and those of Bristol Cathedral Enterprises Limited. It also oversees Chapter's arrangements for the Cathedral's investments, projects, capital spending and, when necessary, taxation. It reviews the Cathedral's risk register. The Committee met five times in the year. It is chaired by a member of Chapter, known as the Canon Treasurer, but includes independent members appointed for their financial acumen and expertise.

Nominations Committee

The Nominations Committee was established as part of the Cathedrals Measure 2021. It was under development in 2023 and will be fully established in 2024. The purpose of the committee is to nominate new members of the Cathedral Chapter, ensuring that the membership reflects the diversity of the community that is served by the Cathedral. It will also advise chapter on nominations to other committees and advisory groups.

Safeguarding Committee

The Safeguarding Committee (established under the new governance arrangements) oversees and promotes safeguarding in the Cathedral. It supports and holds to account those charged with the day to day delivery of effective safeguarding. It is currently chaired by the Dean, who is the Chapter lead for safeguarding. It is the intention of Chapter to appoint an independent chair for this committee during 2024. The diocesan safeguarding advisory is a member of this committee.

External Stakeholder Advisory Group (known as the Cathedral Advisory Group)

The purpose of this group is to furthering and supporting the life and work of the Cathedral in the city and Diocese and advising Chapter, to bring wider perspectives to facilitate Chapter's thinking and approach. Members of this group are appointed by Chapter on the basis of their experience, expertise and community networks. This was established in September 2023 as an advisory group under the Cathedral's Measure 2021.

Community Group

The purpose of the Community Group is furthering and supporting the life and work of the Cathedral and advising Chapter, to bring the perspectives of the worshipping congregation and other internal stakeholders to facilitate Chapter's thinking and approach to the Cathedral's spiritual life, worship, ministry and mission as a place of worship, prayer and service and its whole ministry and mission in the city and Diocese. Members of the group are on the Community Roll and are elected by those on the Community Roll. They are then appointed by Chapter. This was established in September 2023 as an advisory group under the Cathedral's Measure 2021.

Fabric Advisory Committee

The Fabric Advisory Committee advises the Dean and Chapter on all matters relating to the fabric of the Cathedral. An Independent body, it has an external Chair and members appointed based on their knowledge and expertise on heritage and historic building-related matters and provides expert advice and guidance on the physical protection, preservation and development of the Cathedral's buildings and external precincts. The Committee's advice is informed by the Cathedral's Architect and Archaeologist, who are both ex-officio members and retained as consultants. The Committee met on three occasions during the year.

Senior Leadership Team (SLT)

The Senior Leadership Team (SLT) consisting of the Dean, two residentiary Canons, the Chief Operating Officer, the Director of Finance and Operations and Heads of Department met every two weeks to oversee the strategic development and daily operations of the Cathedral on behalf of Chapter.

Key Management Personnel

The Chapter considers that the key management personnel of the Cathedral consist of Executive members of Chapter and the Senior Leadership Team.

Safeguarding

Safeguarding is a key priority in the life of the Church. Chapter is committed to doing all that we can to ensure that the Cathedral's community offers the safest place possible for children, young people and vulnerable adults. This applies to all children, young people and vulnerable adults who visit the Cathedral or participate in worship and other missional, education, volunteering, or outreach activities at the Cathedral.

Chapter has a Service Level Agreement (SLA) with Bristol Diocesan Board of Finance (DBF) for the provision of Safeguarding advice and guidance. It ensures the Cathedral has access to specialist advice and that safeguarding expectations and standards are consistent across the Cathedral and the wider diocese.

The Dean is currently the Chapter lead on safeguarding. The Chief Operating Officer is responsible for ensuring safeguarding arrangements are implemented effectively. The Cathedral employs a Safeguarding and Pastoral Officer who carries out day to day safeguarding activities and has oversight of key processes including safeguarding agreements. The SPO works closely with the Diocesan Safeguarding Team. A member of the Cathedral congregation acts as an independent safeguarding advocate. They are a point of contact for safeguarding concerns, as well as being an ambassador for a positive safeguarding culture across the Cathedral.

Safeguarding is a standing item on the agenda of all Chapter and Senior Leadership Team.

The Cathedral maintains a Safeguarding Improvement Plan which includes recommendations from the 2021 safeguarding audit by the Social Care Institute for Excellence. This is monitored by Chapter through the safeguarding committee. There will be a follow up audit commissioned by the National Safeguarding Team of the Church of England in the first quarter of 2024.

Through the diocesan safeguarding team, and independently, the Cathedral has access to the Local Authority Designated Officer and to statutory social care helplines and other statutory bodies, as required.

Related charities

There are a number of independent charities which are part of the Cathedral's broader governance picture. They are regulated by the Charity Commission, have their own boards, and file annual reports and accounts. They include:

- The Friends of Bristol Cathedral (274399) which support projects that beautify the Cathedral or enhance its facilities.
- The Bristol Cathedral Choral Foundation (270373) which provides supports to the Dean and Chapter for choral worship in the Cathedral.
- The Bristol Cathedral Trust (801008) raises funds for and promotes the development of the Cathedral, focussing on the historic fabric, education and the choral tradition.
- The Cathedral Schools Trust is a multi-academy trust which includes a state secondary academy (Bristol Cathedral Choir School) and a free primary (Cathedral Primary School). They are both located within the Cathedral precincts and rented from the Cathedral. The Trust is legally independent, but the Dean is a Member and Trustee. The predecessor body, Bristol Cathedral School, continues to act as a residual entity and hold property occupied by the school. It continues to publish its own report and accounts with the Charity Commission.

The Chapter notes the contribution of all these bodies, and those individuals who give so generously to our work, and it records its gratitude for the ways in which they enrich the life of the Cathedral.

Statement on fundraising

With our Director of Development in place, we are in a strong position to rebuild our fundraising capacity after a period of a number of years with the post being vacant. Our Resources Working Group met during 2023 and established three key priorities for income generation:

- Increasing visitor income (with the support of the Church Commissioners we will launch an Entry by Donation programme at the beginning of 2024).
- Increased congregational giving (this will start with a campaign to increase giving starting in January 2024).
- A patron scheme to enable those who are passionate about the Cathedral to provide regular financial support (this will be launched at the end of 2024).

In addition to these programmes, we put in regular grant applications to support the work of the Cathedral.

Our public benefit

The trustees of Bristol Cathedral have due regard to the public benefit guidance published by the Charity Commission in determining the activities of the Cathedral. The Cathedral not only serves the local community daily in its religious and charitable work, but it is an active resource in the promotion of religion, music, history, heritage and archaeology. This annual report describes the activities that deliver these core public benefits.

Risk management

The Dean and Chapter are responsible for managing the strategic risks associated with the delivery of the Cathedral's vision and mission. There is a risk register with quarterly reports which is regularly reviewed by the Chapter and Finance Committees. Complex projects have dedicated risk registers. The Finance Committee also discuss the finance risks in relation to investment, management accounts and cash flow. The main strategic risks relate to income levels, reputational risk, safeguarding and staffing changes.

- Safeguarding a service level agreement is in place with the Diocese of Bristol, with the Diocesan Safeguarding Advisor providing technical support. The safeguarding committee met on three occasions.
- Health and safety –Risk assessments and other health and safety arrangements were reviewed regularly during the year.
- Data protection we are registered with the Office of the Information Commissioner. Staff completed their GDPR training.
- Financial there were no known incidents of fraud in 2023.

Future plans

Fabric development:

There has been a great deal of work pushing forward fabric projects during 2023. A full time Clerk of Works has been appointed in order that we are able to deliver these projects effectively.

Organ restoration and refurbishment

This project started towards the end of 2023 with extensive scaffolding being erected in the quire. Final arrangements have also been made for the start of works to remove the organ in January 2024 by organ builders Harrison and Harrison Ltd. The works will continue right through 2024 with case cleaning and the organ will be reinstalled from January 2025. The project is expected to be completed by the summer of 2025. In 2024 a new interactive exhibition telling the story of the organ will be opening, accompanied by a multisensory family trail.

Seafarers floor

This project will see the floor of the Seafarers Chapel re-laid to create an even floor, reducing the risk of trips and falls, particularly for those who are disabled. It will also include the provision of two new permanent ramps – one into the chapel from the north transept and one from the chapel into the quire. This work forms part of our work to improve physical access in and around the Cathedral. Permission has been granted for this project by the CFCE during 2023. We are very pleased to have the support of the Headley Trust and the Bristol Cathedral Trust for this work and further fundraising is ongoing.

Sound system

We tendered the installation of a new sound system in 2023 and have been working with the preferred installer since then to develop the design. This project will greatly improve the experience of worshipping in the Cathedral, as well as creating opportunities for the Cathedral to hold more events. It is expected that this project will be completed in early autumn 2024.

Café refurbishment

Listed building consent was granted for this project in 2023 and the project was tendered. It is anticipated to start in May 2024 with a projected opening in September 2024. The works will update the café to make it more attractive, increase the seating capacity and create level access to the café from the cloister and out into the garden. We are very grateful to the Friends of Bristol Cathedral and the Bristol Cathedral Trust for their support for this project.

Monument repairs

In early 2024 we will begin a number of urgent repairs to various wall mounted monuments around the Cathedral to ensure that they are safe.

Clergy housing

Works started on the conversion of one of our residential properties from a house with a separate flat in the basement into one whole house for a residentiary canon. This will be

completed in 2024 in time for the anticipated appointment of the new residentiary canon following the retirement of Canon Nicola Stanley in January 2024.

Access

Work will continue on the urgent adaptations required to improve access to the Cathedral for disabled people. With the Café and Seafarers floor works underway, this project is moving forward. Work will continue in 2024 on the development of the project to install a lift to enable step free access from the Nave to the Chapter house, garden and toilets.

Governance:

Following the completion of our registration with the Charity Commission in September 2023 we will continue to develop the new governance structures, with a focus on creating more diverse membership across our boards and committees.

Developing a masterplan:

With the expected start and completion of many fabric projects that had been delayed by the Covid-19 pandemic during 2024, we will be turning our attention to the development of a masterplan for the Cathedral precincts. This plan will identify our space requirements for effectively meeting our charitable objects and strategic aims in the future and identify the best way of achieving these.

Project 30:

We will continue to progress our work to achieve net zero by 2030 in line with the national Church of England target. A small group has been meeting throughout 2023 to move this project forward, including representatives of Chapter, the staff team, and the congregation. We achieved the Eco Church bronze award during 2023 and expect to achieve the silver award in 2024. We are expecting support from the Church Commissioners for additional feasibility work in this area. We will be continuing to explore connecting to the city's district heating network (aiming for 2027) and the installation of photovoltaic panels on the roof of the Cathedral.

Income generation:

Towards the end of 2023 we had confirmation of a new Cathedral Sustainability Fund grant from the Church Commissioners to support the implementation of an entry by donation project. The aim of this project is to increase visitor donations. We will employ a team of Visitor Experience Assistants to ask for donations. This team will work with our volunteer welcomers – enabling them to not have to worry about asking for donations and spend time with our visitors.

We will be developing a patron programme, enabling people from across the city and diocese to make a regular gift to the Cathedral. This will build on the work of the Friends of Bristol Cathedral and the Fitzhardinge Society.

Visitor experience, education and events:

We have been delighted to welcome the University of the West of England to the Cathedral for its graduations for over thirty years. These ceremonies have grown year on year and have now sadly outgrown the Cathedral, so in November 2023 we had our last set of UWE graduations. While this is a financial

challenge for the Cathedral, we have an opportunity to increase our programme of events to welcome more people through our doors and engage with our story as a Cathedral. In 2024 we will be welcoming the Luke Jerram installation, Gaia (a seven metre in diameter artwork of the earth suspended in the crossing of the cathedral). It will be with us in October accompanied by a full programme of events exploring themes around migration and climate. After a very successful show in 2023, we will see the return of the Lux Muralis light show in November 2024. We have seen an increasing number and diversity of events in the Cathedral over 2023 and we expect that to continue in 2024. This is not only important for us financially – but also enables us to welcome more people into the Cathedral who may not have come in before.

We will be increasing our offer to schools and families including weekly "Crafty Cathedral" sessions during the summer and additional activities around key points in the Christian calendar.

Worship and liturgy

During 2024 we will be developing a "Fresh Expression" aiming to attract younger people to engage in worship, complimenting our existing services (https://www.churchofengland.org/about/fresh-expressions-church-england).

Volunteers

We will be appointing a volunteer coordinator in 2024 to ensure our volunteer community are supported well. They will also look at recruiting new volunteers and identifying new opportunities across the Cathedral. This was identified by the resources working group as an important step to increase our volunteering capacity.

2023 Financial review

The total funds at 31 December 2023 totalled £7,228,177, compared to £7,332,442 in the previous year, a decrease of £104,265. The total income for the year was £1,485,384 (2022: £1,503,416) a decrease of £18,032 from the previous year. The expenditure for the year totalled £1,795,833 (2022: £1,676,236), an increase of £119,597 from the previous year.

The cost-of-living crisis in 2023 put a severe burden on disposable income and it was not surprising to see that the amounts received as donations from congregation and visitors was down to £206,126 (2022: £275,305). The Dean and Chapter are particularly grateful to those who have continued to give regularly to the Cathedral. Several initiatives have been planned for 2024 to increase congregational giving and visitor donations. Entry by donation will be introduced in April 2024 and a Cathedral Patronage scheme launched later in the year. A successful grant application was made to the Cathedral Sustainability Fund to cover the additional welcomer posts needed.

During the year, the Cathedral hosted Luxmuralis, a projection art gallery. This raised £117k for Cathedral funds.

Operating costs of the Cathedral increased. New energy contracts were signed at considerably inflated costs. Payroll costs increased as the Cathedral invested in more staff to meet its aims and objectives.

As investment markets recovered so did the value of the Cathedral's investments.

Investment performance

CCLA Investment Management Ltd is responsible for managing the Dean and Chapter's equity, fixed interest and property investments. They have a strong focus on ethical investment and work closely with the Church of England Ethical Investment Advisory Group. The portfolio is kept under regular review by the Dean and Chapter and the Finance Advisory Committee which provides expert oversight and advice. Overall, markets have performed well and CCLA managed to maintain the level of income.

Bristol Cathedral Trust

In 2023, Bristol Cathedral Trust reimbursed the Cathedral £48.5k for the Development Director and made grants totalling £68.2k to the Chapter. These grants were received towards the replacement of the fire alarm, new rainwater pipes and fabric work.

Bristol Cathedral Enterprises Ltd (BCE)

BCE is the trading arm of Bristol Cathedral and consists of the café and the shop. The accounts for BCE are prepared separately to this report and are submitted to Companies House¹, but the figures are then consolidated into the Dean and Chapter report. The outturn for 2023 was a surplus of £3.7k. The Café remained closed throughout the year while plans for its refurbishment were finalised. Tenders for the work were invited and a contractor has been chosen to commence the work during the summer of 2024.

Investment policy

We have a long-term investment policy, which is reviewed each year. Our objective was to maintain a diversified and ethically invested portfolio that provided sufficient income to support the Cathedral's operational budget, while still allowing for long-term capital growth. This was achieved with an investment portfolio in the ratio 83% in the CBF Investment Fund, 8% in the CBF Property Fund, 9% in the CBF Global Equity Fund. The Cathedral held £1.2m cash of which £1m is held in a separate account for the organ refurbishment project.

Reserves policy

Reserves are needed to allow the Cathedral to be managed efficiently and to avoid any interruption in activities, as well as to cover exceptional repair and other items. The Chapter considers that an appropriate level of unrestricted reserves in the short term at 31 December 2023 would be at least £500.0k. This is a *de minimis* figure and over time Chapter would like to see the level of unrestricted reserves increasing. This is based on an estimate of ongoing expenditure commitments over a two-year period. The actual level of those reserves at 31 December 2023 was £723k (excluding properties). The gap between actual reserves and the policy is closely monitored and the gap is affected by the timing of significant fabric projects within the Cathedral. Any surplus reserves are invested to contribute to the ongoing costs of maintaining the Cathedral. In the calculation, Cathedral housing and property assets have been excluded. Investment performance is closely monitored and the impact on reserves is regularly reviewed.

Investment property

The Cathedral has no investment property, as all the houses it owns are occupied by clergy or lay staff for the more efficient performance of duties. Portions of the historic precincts are also let to the Cathedral Schools Trust.

Endowment and restricted funds

These can only be used for the purposes for which the funds were given. The Cathedral has several such funds, details of which are set out in note 16 and 17 of the accounts.

The Cathedrals Measure

The Cathedral completed the process of becoming a registered charity under the auspices of the Charity Commission.

The Dean and Chapter's responsibilities

The Dean and Chapter of Bristol Cathedral are responsible for preparing the Trustees' Annual Report and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and the United Kingdom Accounting Standards (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice).

Trustees are required by the law applicable to charities in England and Wales to prepare financial statements for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the charity's state of affairs and its incoming resources and application of resource for that period. In preparing those financial statements, the Trustees are required to:

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently,
- observe the methods and principles in the Charities SORP 2019 (FRS 102),
- make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent,

- state whether applicable accounting standards have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements, and
- prepare the financial statements on a going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charity will continue in operation.

The Trustees are responsible for keeping proper accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charity and enable them to ensure the financial statements comply with the Charities Act 2011, the Charity (Accounts and Reports) Regulations 2008 and the provisions of the Trust Deed. They have general responsibility for taking such steps as are reasonably open to them to safeguard the assets of the charity and to prevent and detect fraud and other irregularities.

In so far as the Trustees are aware:

- there is no relevant audit information of which the cathedral auditors are unaware, and
- the Trustees have taken all steps which they ought to have taken to make themselves aware of any audit information and to establish that the auditors are aware of that information.

OPINION

We have audited the financial statements of The Cathedral Church of the Holy and Undivided Trinity in Bristol (the 'Cathedral') and its subsidiary (the 'group') for the year ended 31 December 2023 which comprise the Consolidated Statement of Financial Activities, the Consolidated Balance Sheet, the Cathedral Balance Sheet, the Consolidated Statement of Cash Flows and the related notes, including a summary of significant accounting policies. Based on the work we have performed, we have not identified any material uncertainties relating to events or conditions that, individually or collectively, may cast significant doubt on the Group's ability to continue as a going concern for a period of at least twelve months from when the financial statements are authorised for issue.

In connection with our audit of the financial statements, our responsibility is to read the other information and, in doing so, consider whether the other information is materially inconsistent with the financial statements or our knowledge obtained in the audit or otherwise appears to be materially misstated. If we identify such material inconsistencies or apparent material misstatements, we are required to determine

As explained more fully in the Chapter's Responsibilities Statement, the Chapter members are responsible for the preparation of the financial statements and for being satisfied that they give a true and fair view, and for such internal control as the Chapter members determine is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, the Chapter members are responsible for assessing the Group's and the Cathedral's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless the Chapter members either intend to liquidate the Group or the Cathedral or to cease operations, or have no realistic alternative but to do so.

AUDITORS' RESPONSIBILITIES FOR THE AUDIT OF THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an Auditors' Report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance but is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with ISAs (UK) will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the basis of these financial statements. Irregularities, including fraud, are instances of non-compliance with laws and regulations. We design procedures in line with our responsibilities, outlined above, to detect material misstatements in respect of irregularities, including fraud.

The extent to which our procedures are capable of detecting irregularities, including fraud is detailed below:

- We have considered the nature of the sector, control environment and financial performance;
- We have considered the results of enquiries with management and Chapter members in relation to their own identification and assessment of the risk of irregularities within the entity; and
- We have reviewed the documentation of key processes and controls and performed walkthroughs of transactions to confirm that the systems are operating in line with documentation.

As a result of these procedures, we have considered the opportunities and incentives that may exist within the organisation for fraud and identified the highest area of risk to be in relation to revenue recognition, with a particular risk in relation to year-end cut off. In common with all audits under ISAs (UK) we are also required to perform specific procedures to respond to the risk of management override.

We have also obtained understanding of the legal and regulatory frameworks that the Cathedral operates in, focusing on provisions of those laws and regulations that had a direct effect on the determination of material amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The key laws and regulations we considered in this context included in Section 27 of the Cathedrals Measure 1999, FRS 102 and UK tax legislation. In additions, we considered the provisions of other laws and regulations that do not have a direct effect on the financial statements but compliance with which may be fundamental to the Cathedral's ability to operate or avoid a material penalty.

Our procedures to respond to risks identified included the following:

- Reviewing the financial statement disclosures and testing to supporting documentation to assess compliance with provisions of relevant laws and regulations described as having a direct effect on the financial statements;
- Performing analytical procedures to identify unusual or unexpected relationships that may indicate risks of material misstatement due to fraud;
- Reviewing board meeting minutes;
- Enquiring of management in relation to actual and potential claims or litigations;
- Performing detailed transactional testing in relation to the recognition of revenue, specifically grants, with a particular focus around year-end cut off; and
- In addressing the risk of fraud through management override of controls, testing the appropriateness of journal entries and other adjustments; assessing whether the judgments made in accounting estimates are indicative of potential bias; and evaluating the business rationale of significant transactions that are unusual or outside the normal course of business.

We also communicated identified laws and regulations and potential fraud risks to all members of the engagement team and remained alert to possible indicators of fraud or non-compliance with laws and regulations throughout the audit.

As a result of the inherent limitations of an audit, there is a risk that not all irregularities, including a material misstatement in financial statements or non-compliance with regulation, will be detected by us. The risk increases the further removed compliance with a law and regulation is from the events and transactions reflected in the financial statements, given we will be less likely to be aware of it, or should the irregularity occur as a result of fraud rather than a one off error, as this may involve intentional concealment, forgery, collusion, omission or misrepresentation.

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of Accounting

The accounts (financial statements) have been prepared under the historical cost convention with items recognised at cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant notes to these accounts. The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice: Accounting and Reporting by Charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019), and the Charities Act 2011.

The financial statements have been prepared to give a 'true and fair' view and have departed from the Charities (Accounts and Reports) Regulations 2008 only to the extent required to provide a 'true and fair view'. This departure has involved following Accounting and Reporting by Charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland issued in October 2019 rather than the Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice effective from 1 April 2005 which has since been withdrawn.

The Dean and Chapter of Bristol constitutes a public benefit entity as defined by FRS 102.

Going Concern

Chapter assesses whether the use of going concern is appropriate, i.e. whether there are any material uncertainties related to events or conditions that may cast significant doubt on the ability of the Cathedral to continue as a going concern. Chapter make this assessment in respect of a period of one year from the date of approval of the financial statements.

On the matter of the concept of going concern, the Cathedral Chapter is confident that it holds sufficient funds in unrestricted reserves to cover the levels of drawdown that will be needed to balance the relatively modest income and expenditure difference.

Heritage assets

Bristol Cathedral and its ancillary buildings are classified as heritage assets. Bristol Cathedral does not consider that reliable cost or valuation information can be obtained owing to the incomparable nature of the assets. Even if valuations could be obtained, the cost of providing such information would outweigh any benefit to the users of the financial statements. Consequently, heritage assets are not recognised in the balance sheet.

Basis of consolidation

The consolidated financial statements include the Cathedral and its subsidiary, Bristol Cathedral Enterprises Limited. Intra-group income and expenditure are eliminated fully on consolidation. The activities of Bristol Cathedral Trust, The Friends of Bristol Cathedral, The Bristol Cathedral Choral Foundation, Bristol Cathedral School and Bristol Cathedral Choir School have not been consolidated because the Cathedral does not control those activities.

Depreciation

Depreciation is calculated so as to write off the cost of tangible fixed assets, less their estimated residual value, on a straight line basis over the expected useful economic life of the asset concerned. Depreciation is calculated at the following rates:

Equipment, fixtures and fittings

Over 3-20 years

Non-investment property included in fixed assets is maintained, as a matter of Cathedral policy, by way of a programme of repair and refurbishment such that the residual value of the property is at least equal to its book value. Therefore, the Chapter considers the value of depreciation of the freehold property to be immaterial and no charge has been made.

Capitalisation of Fixed Assets

NOTES TO THE ACCOUNTS (continued)

All fixed assets over £5,000 purchased or received by way of gift (other than heritage assets) are capitalised and shown in the balance sheet.

Investments

Investments are shown in the balance sheet at market value. Any realised or unrealised gains are allocated to the relevant fund and shown in the Statement of Financial Activities.

Pension Costs

The Cathedral makes contributions to a defined contribution scheme in respect of some of its staff. The assets of the schemes are held separately from those of the Cathedral in independently administered funds. The amounts charged against income represent contributions payable to the schemes by the Cathedral in respect of the accounting period.

Grants, Donations and Legacies

Grants, donations and legacies subject to restrictions are credited to the appropriate fund when they are received or become receivable. Restricted amounts received in respect of the purchase of a depreciated fixed asset are credited to the Statement of Financial Activities and an amount debited to the restricted fund each year in respect of the depreciation of the asset.

Third party receipts and payments

Where amounts are payable on behalf of the cathedral by third parties then these are shown under both income and expenditure.

Stock

Stock is stated at the lower of cost and net realisable value.

Debtors

Trade and other debtors are recognised at the settlement amount after any trade discount offered. Prepayments are valued at the amount prepaid net of any trade discounts due.

Cash at Bank and in Hand

Cash at bank and in hand includes cash and short term highly liquid investments with a short maturity of three months or less from the date of acquisition or opening of the deposit or similar account.

Liabilities and Provisions

Liabilities are recognised when there is an obligation at the Balance Sheet date as a result of a past event, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefit will be required in settlement and the amount of the settlement can be estimated reliably.

Liabilities are recognised at the amount the Charity anticipates it will pay to settle the debt or the amount it has received as advanced payments for the goods or services it must provide.

Provisions are measured at the best estimate of the amounts required to settle the obligation. Where the effect of the time value of money is material, the provision is based upon the present value of those amounts, discounted at the pre-tax discount rate that reflects the risks specific to the liability. The unwinding of the discount is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities as a finance cost.

Operating Leases

Rentals under operating leases are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities on a straight line basis over the lease term.

Funds

The Cathedral funds are analysed into three different categories as follows:

Unrestricted funds are expendable at the discretion of the Chapter in furtherance of the Ministry of the Cathedral.

Bristol Cathedral NOTES TO THE ACCOUNTS (continued) for the year ended 31 December 2023

Restricted funds are designated for specific purposes within the Cathedral operations. The related expenditure of these funds is charged to these funds.

The largest restricted fund is the Cathedral's Fabric Fund. The Fabric Fund is held for the purpose of defraying the costs of maintaining or enhancing the Cathedral fabric, including professional fees and insurance.

Included in restricted funds are capital amortization funds. These include grants received and spent on the purchase of fixed assets. These funds are being amortized in line with the depreciation of the relevant fixed asset. The balance on these funds does not represent unspent funds.

Endowment funds are restricted funds where the Cathedral has no power to convert the capital into income but can apply income derived from the funds for the general purposes of the Cathedral.

Allocation of administrative services

All costs are allocated between the expenditure categories of the Statement of Financial Activities on a basis designed to reflect the use of the resource. Costs relating to a particular activity are allocated directly, others are apportioned on an appropriate basis, as detailed in note 4.

17. RESTRICTED FUNDS (continued)

The Church Commissioners fund represents the grants received by the Cathedral under section 21 and 23 of the Cathedrals Measure 1999 towards the Dean and Residentiary Canons stipends and Lay salaries.

The Music fund represents the money donated towards enhancing the work of the Cathedral's music department and includes funds to support the singers (children and adults), to underwrite and support choir tours.

The Organ fund represents money donated towards the repair and restoration of any of the Cathedral's organs.

The Fabric Fund includes money donated towards the costs of maintaining the fabric, floors, and bells of the Cathedral. The funding may be also used for emergency and compliance related issues, feasibility studies and archaeological works. It may also be used for works on residential properties owned by the Dean and Chapter.

The WW1 Cathedral Repair Fund represents a government grant towards the cost of replacing the Cathedral's boilers. The costs have been capitalised as fixed assets and therefore the expenditure shown is depreciation on those assets.

The other category represents the funds for the maintenance of the flagpole.

18. PENSION

Bristol Cathedral participates in the Pension Builder Scheme section of Church Workers' Pension Scheme for lay staff. The Scheme is administered by the Church of England Pensions Board, which holds the assets of the schemes separately from those of the Employer and the other participating employers.

The Pension Builder Classic is a mix between a defined contribution and a defined benefit pension scheme. This makes it a 'hybrid' scheme. Its technical name is a 'With Profits – Deferred Annuity' Pension scheme.

Pension Builder Classic provides a pension for members for payment from retirement, accumulated from contributions paid and converted into a deferred annuity during employment based on terms set and reviewed by the Church of England Pensions Board from time to time. Discretionary increases may also be added, depending on investment returns and other factors.

There is no sub-division of assets between employers in each section of the Pension Builder Scheme.

The scheme is a multi-employer scheme as described in Section 28 of FRS 102 as it is not possible to attribute the Pension Builder Scheme's assets and liabilities to specific employers. This means that contributions are accounted for as if the Scheme were a defined contribution scheme. The pensions costs charged to the SoFA in the year are contributions payable (2023: £45,857, 2022: £38,293).

A valuation of the Pension Builder Scheme is carried out once every three years. The most recent was carried out as at 31 December 2019.

For the Pension Builder Classic section, the valuation revealed a deficit of $\pounds 4.8m$ on the ongoing assumptions used. At the most recent annual review, the Board chose not to grant a discretionary bonus, which will have acted to improve the funding position. There is no requirement for deficit payments at the current time. There is a potential liability if Bristol Cathedral leave the scheme, or if other employers fail.
